Intake and prioritization (includes intake for living docs)	 Status of requests and completed products (including plain language summaries) John walked participants through the products in progress (and the teams supporting the work), completed products and expected updates for living evidence profiles and syntheses. Maureen D. advised that NCCMT has started a new rapid review on parental vaccine confidence and uptake. The team will be looking at qualitative studies and will be reaching out to select other teams who are looking at quantitative studies on this topic, to see if there is a way to connect the reviews. Rob suggested a possible request about healthcare workers burnout and labormarket issues. Several participants pointed to work underway in AB and by NCCMT on the topic. Adjustments to existing process	 Horizon scans are published once a month and include a briefing note about emerging issues, and a panel summary about priority issues for Canada. We have been running the global horizon scanning for a year, and the Canadian panel has now been active for two months. We continue to have one briefing note, but now two summaries (global and Canada) emerging from the panel meetings. We now have the COVID-END global prioritizing working group helping to determine questions where evidence syntheses are urgently needed, and helping to identifying teams globally to work on responses 	1 min

Evidence-synthesis teams	 Quarterly meetings of the evidence-synthesis teams: one completed 29 March, next quarterly meeting is booked for 22 June which will focus on how we can strengthen intelligence sharing. A survey was conducted about the teams' content expertise and working with citizen partners. Teams who are taking on living evidence syntheses are matched with citizen partners. A webpage 'Resources for researchers' has been further enhanced Teams are reminded to share with the secretariat relevant work that they took on, and work completed for other projects, and to ask us to search the global inventory (until it is fully searchable online) and searchable Excel database of Canadian 	3 min

1. Citizen partnership	 Recruitment and orientation of Canadian citizen partners completed. Citizen partners are being matched with research teams, and resources about how to work with citizen partners have been made available on the website 24 patients/citizens completed a 10-hour training program on rapid reviews and patient/citizen engagement in reviews. They are enthusiastic about working with research teams either through SPOR EA studies or COVID-END. COVID-END in Canada has matched 9 citizens so far. A template to be used by evidence teams to request citizen engagement is available. Maureen Dobbins is interested in a discussion with other evidence teams about how to use input from citizens who collaborate on rapid reviews (e.g., her team worked with two citizens on a food insecurity rapid review and ended up including in the key messages one point from citizens about what they felt was missing in research). A sub-group might be interested in connecting about this, or we can discuss at the evidence-synthesis teams meeting on 22 June. ACTION: Secretariat to add citizen presentation to the 22 June meeting idone. ACTION: Secretariat to circulate the request template with the meeting notes idone - virulated with notes).

Indigenous peoples engagement	 Plans underway to connect with five teams who received CIHR funding for knowledge syntheses; also, connection with contact from CoVaRR (see below) Margo Greenwood is the focal point for Indigenous peoples engagement within COVID-END. She has been supporting the successful vaccine uptake in Indigenous communities in BC and will now connect with Jeremy about how the insights from this work can inform the behavioural science syntheses that his team is running. John and Margo will be reaching out to the five CIHR-funded teams who have taken on questions related to Indigenous Peoples and COVID-19, to discuss collaboration with COVID-END in Canada and offer our resources to support their work.

CIHR- and NSERC-funded networks	 CIHR-funded Coronavirus Variants Rapid Response Network (CoVaRR) - Marc-André Langlois, PI; Jeremy Grimshaw Co-PI Jeremy noted the network includes three pillars that intersect with COVID-END: applied science; Indigenous engagement; and knowledge mobilization. It has a strong basic-science focus (about two thirds of the work) to identify and characterize variants of concern.
