•	a. Challenges faced by low-and middle-income countries (see attachment 2) Attachment 2 was presented and discussed: COVID-19 is magnifying some of the challenges that existed before In some areas of the world (e.g. Africa) a lot of the decsions being made are due to	
	economic reasons rather than health - COVID-19 related health risks in workplaces will likely increase overtime	
•	There is currently much less research and synthesis activity outside of health domains in COVID-19	
•	Challenges differ from country-to-country and within countries	
•	Are there any practical suggestions that could be offered to mitigate the challenges?	
•	Can the practical challenges be mitigated with funding? $\circ$ Funding could help to a degree	
	• Some data-heavy activities that require a lot of bandwidth (e.g. downloading search files) could use some help from other COVID-END partners	
	<ul> <li>Some of the solutions being proposed by other groups in COVID-END that are focused on avoiding waste may help (e.g. not having to search separate data bases, common screening processes)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Would something like Cochrane passive exchange(?) be helpful in the short- term?</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Can there be some support on the synthesis of international literature so countries could focus on tailoring to their context?</li> </ul>	
•	Birte mentioned the survey they are conducting. Key issues that are coming out in survey are often socio-economic and not health, such as food security, social protection, employment and others + are of a different magnitude in LMIC context - key questions and challenges are unique. How can this be addressed in the activities of COVID-END?	

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•	So far in COVID-END there has been limited discussion of policy questions, would be useful to reflect on how much the COVID-END activities reflect these issues	
•	What are the priorities for COVID-19 in the short, medium and long term? Seems to start at the personal level (e.g. mask wearing) but how to we expand out to organizational and system level concerns?	
•	HB mentioned horizon scanning activity as a potential way to surface some of the emergent priorities and invited suggestions of what	
•	Charles and colleagues are working on a scan of what groups are working on who are advising decision makers at the regional level	
•	<ul> <li>How can COVID-END make these issues more visible? Could we (COVID-END community) pitch the idea of commentary or blog to raise visibility; (e.g. if donors want to help, provide IT resources for people to do this work from home)</li> <li>WG members expressed broad receptivity to this idea</li> <li>COVID-END could bring some weight and visibility to issues</li> <li>Need to ensure we engage COVID-END partners from Asian countries</li> <li>Connections to survey the at Birte's group is doing</li> <li>Need to recognize the great strides that have been made in the past 20 years in evidence synthesis and translation communities, need to maintain and build from that</li> </ul>
